Summary of Unit:

Fiction vs. Nonfiction Writing. Discuss famous authors from Mississippi and publish student stories.

Lesson Objectives:

- Discuss famous authors from Mississippi •
- Discuss Pulitzer Prize
- Explain the difference in fiction and nonfiction •
- Write a short story that is either fiction or • nonfiction



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Lesson Structure:

- The teacher will introduce the lesson by showing the *Mississippi*, *Believe It!*TM Author poster.
- As a whole group, the teacher and students can discuss a Pulitzer Prize, and which Mississippi authors won it, with the Pulitzer Prize handout.
- Show students the fiction and nonfiction handouts. Discuss the meaning of fiction and nonfiction writing. List examples of books that fit into each category that your class has read or discussed.
- Have students complete the fiction and nonfiction activity.
- The teacher will discuss the answers on the Fiction vs. Nonfiction chart with the students. This discussion can be as in depth as your students need to comprehend what fiction and nonfiction are.
- Have students draw a ticket out of a bowl (fiction or nonfiction). Then students will write a short story according to their fiction or nonfiction ticket.
- Students go through the writing process with their story. This includes brainstorming, first draft, peer editing, and writing conference with teacher, and final draft.
- Extended activity can be done at this time.



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Guiding Questions:

- 1. What famous authors do you know from Mississippi?
- 2. What is the Pulitzer Prize?
- 3. Explain fiction text.
- 4. Explain nonfiction text.
- 5. What are the steps to writing a published short story?

Activities:

Fiction and Nonfiction Activity:

This can be done in pairs, small group, or whole group. Give students a copy of the Fiction vs. Nonfiction chart. This can be shown on the board to save time. Have students list examples of fiction and nonfiction characters, plots, or stories. (Fiction – aliens, imaginary things, a person that can fly, talking animals, etc.) (Nonfiction – true life stories of a person, place, or thing, science articles, biography of a famous person, etc.)

Extended Activity:

After students have written and published the final draft of their story, the teacher can give construction paper and colors for the students to illustrate a scene from their writing.


